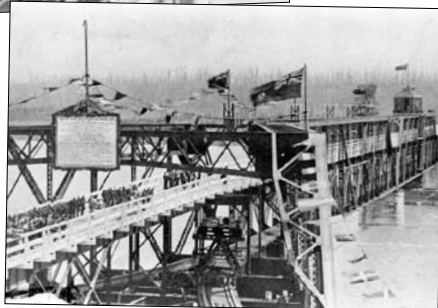

RESOURCES

- **City records**, such as bylaws, annual reports, departmental records, and civic publications which document the city's governmental history. A highlight of this collection is the original Minutes of Surrey Council from 1880–1995.

- **Community records**, including diaries, personal papers, scrapbooks, manuscripts, research notes, and records of local businesses and organizations.

- Thousands of **historic photographs**, some which date back to the late 1800s, documenting the city's history.

- Thousands of **maps, plans, and architectural drawings**.

- **Oral history tapes** featuring interviews with many long-time Surrey residents.

- Extensive holdings of **local newspapers**, including the Surrey Leader and The Columbian.

- Over 10,000 **school registers** from many Surrey schools, dating from 1890–1971.

- A **Reference Library** of over 2,000 publications on such diverse topics as local and B.C. history, First Nations people, architectural heritage, antique identification, and much more.

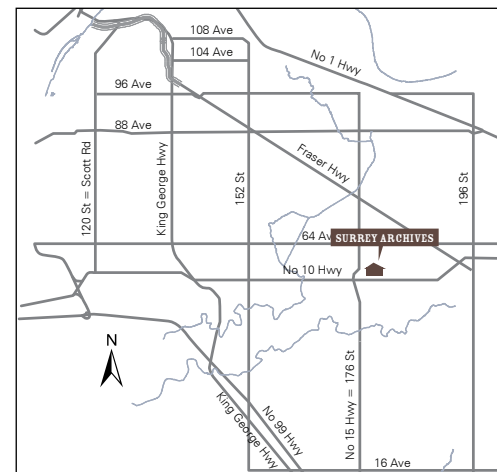

- After October 1, click on **Surrey Archives and Museum Online Access (SAMOA)** to see thousands of images from the 1960s. Use SAMOA to search our Community Records collection too!

• WHAT'S NEW •

SAMOA Updates—We've been working hard to get more images into our online database. After October 1, you'll be able to search and view nearly 3000 additional photographs from your home computer, laptop, or smartphone. The uploads include images of Whalley, Cloverdale, Crescent Beach, and various Surrey transportation scenes, from our Historical Photographs Collection. Also included are over 2300 images from our Surrey Leader Negative Collection from 1965–66.

Surrey's Early Schools

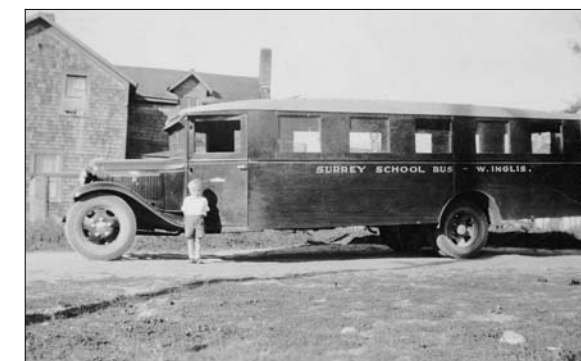
A look back at the days when schools consisted of only one room. Join local historian Jack Brown as he traces the history of Surrey's early schools.
