SUBJECT: 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships – Request for

Funding Assistance

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Finance Committee recommend that Council approve financial support to the Optimist Junior International Curling Club (The "Club") in the amount of \$3,200 from the Council Initiatives Fund to assist with the costs that the Club will incur in hosting the 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships all as generally described in this report.

INTENT

The purpose of this report is to obtain approval to provide financial support for the Under 18 Curling Championships that are being held in Surrey and Langley in March 2013.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting on October 1, 2012 Council considered a request from the Optimist Junior International Curling Club (the "Club") to appear before Council regarding the Under 18 Curling Championships. Council at that meeting referred the matter to the Parks, Recreation & Sport Tourism Committee. Representatives of the Club appeared before the Parks, Recreation & Sport Tourism Committee at its meeting on October 17, 2012 at which time they requested funding from the City to offset some of the costs associated with hosting the 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships which will be held jointly at the Cloverdale Curling Club and the Langley Curling Club from March 27th to 31st, 2013 (see Appendix "A").

Over the 12 years since its inception, the U-18 Curling Championships has grown from a Western Canadian championships event to an international event. The current format includes 12 male and 12 female teams from Canada, the USA, Asia and Europe. The event, which is held every two years, was previously hosted in Surrey/Langley in 2003. It has also been hosted in Calgary, Winnipeg, Regina and Toronto.

DISCUSSION

The 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships will be held jointly at the Cloverdale Curling Club and the Langley Curling Club from March 28th to March 31st, 2013. Teams representing BC, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, the Territories and Atlantic Canada will be involved along with teams from the USA, Europe and Japan.

The event will include a Coach and Athlete Development Camp led by expert Canadian Curling Association National coaches. This is an important cornerstone of the Championships.

The 2013 Championships will have a positive economic impact in Surrey and Langley with each of the 24 teams involving an entourage of at least 13 people along with fans. It is estimated that the local economic impact will be in the order of \$400,000 related to the event.

The Club has requested \$17,000 to support the event to assist with accommodations and other associated expenses. The budget for the event is \$118,000.

The following is a list of events that have been held in Surrey over the last few years for which Council has provided financial support through the Council Initiatives Fund:

The Parks, Recreation and Sport Tourism Committee reviewed the Club's request during its meeting on November 21, 2012 and resolved to recommend to Council that funding in the amount of \$4,200 be provided to the Club. The minutes of this Committee meeting will be included on the same Council agenda as this report.

The Club also applied to the City for a grant under the One-Time Community Grant Program. A grant to the Club for the subject event has been approved by the Finance Committee in the amount of \$1000 under the City's One-Time Grants Program.

Based on the above-referenced resolution of the Parks, Recreation & Sport Tourism Committee and the fact that a grant to the Club of \$1000 has already been approved under the One-Time Grants Program, it is proposed that Council provide additional financial support in the amount of \$3,200 to the Club for the subject event and that this be taken from the Council Initiatives Fund.

Status of the Council Initiatives Fund:

Appendix "B" provides the status of funding in the Council Initiatives Fund on an assumption that Council will approve the recommendation of this report.

SUSTAINABILITY CONSIDERATIONS

Supporting the hosting of 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships in Surrey will assist in achieving the objectives of the City's Sustainability Charter; more particularly, Charter action item SC12: "Encourage and facilitate volunteerism and participation in community activities by persons of all ages, abilities and cultural communities."

CONCLUSION

Based on the above discussion, it is recommended that the Finance Committee recommend that Council approve financial support to the Optimist Junior International Curling Club in the amount of \$3,200 from the Council Initiatives Fund to assist with the costs that the Club will incur in hosting the 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships all as generally described in this report.

I would like to appear before the City of Surrey Council as a delegation representing the Optimist Junior International Curling Club. We will be hosting the 13th annual Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships in Surrey and Langley from March 27th to 31st, 2013.

Our event will host 24 teams invited from Canadian Provinces, the United States, Asian Pacific countries and Europe. Twelve under-18 men's and twelve under-18 women's teams will experience 5 days of development opportunities, round robin competition and challenge for world seeding.

The event budget is \$118,000 and a full benefit presentation will be submitted to the Office of the City Clerk.

An Executive Summary of the Optimist International Championships is Page 2 of this letter and 1 will provide a package of stellar accolades that we've received from famous curlers and a well-known television broadcaster.

The PowerPoint presentation will take up to 5 minutes and allow up to 5 minutes for questions and answers.

The presentation includes a diagram of the Canadian Sport for Life (CS4L) movement depicting the Long Term Athlete Development (LTAD) model as a continuum for Optimist youth curling development. Our Showcase Optimist project is the Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships, designed to create community-wide awareness of our mission to address the issues of "Why Youth Curling?" listed in the handout.

The presentation will close with a request for \$17,000.00 funding support from the City of Surrey to go towards hosting the event. We will also complete a City of Surrey Community Grant application.



Executive Summary of the Event

This competition began in 2001, providing a much-needed major competition to encourage and develop young curlers in the sport that so many of us love and which has given us so much. In 12 years, the event has grown from Western Canadian Championships to the international event that we are eagerly and enthusiastically continuing in British Columbia. This major event has been hosted in Cloverdale and Langley, BC; Calgary, Alberta; Winnipeg, Manitoba; Regina, Saskatchewan; Toronto, Ontarlo and is now returning to Surrey and Langley for 2013 and 2014.

These championships Invite 12 male & 12 female teams from Canada, the USA, Asia and Europe. The participants represent the finest Under-18 curlers in the world. They may even have Inspired, In part, the concept of the first Youth Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria 2012. Participating Canadian teams are from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, Northwest Territorles and Atlantic Canada. Each year, the event holds invitations for as many as 8 international youth teams with 4 representing American states, 2 representing Asian countries and 2 representing European countries.

Our showcase event is staged entirely by volunteers drawn from Curling Clubs and Service Clubs coordinated by one event staff administrator. The hours that are contributed by these volunteers total in the thousands. The Optimist Clubs, and their members, truly live and operate by their motto: "Friend of Youth" so the young athletes may compete fully immersed in "The Spirit of Curling".

Until now, there has been a major individual benefactor, but this funding source will not continue and the event must now "stand on its own two feet". In August, 2012, the Optimist Junior International Curling Club, chartered member of the Optimist International® organization, was incorporated as a fundraising vehicle to deliver this event as a community service project dedicated to bringing out the best in klds.

An integral part of the event is the international development camp, carefully tailored to assist the participants in honing their competition skills and serve their Individual Long Term Athlete Development needs. There will also be the establishment of a legacy fund with any surplus to provide funding for instruction and development of youth curlers in the host region and province - the most important benefit of hosting and sponsoring this event.

The 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships will be held jointly at the Cloverdale Curling Club and the Langley Curling Club, British Columbia from March 27th to 31st. Both venues will be within easy driving distance from Abbotsford and Vancouver International Airports. The two Curling Clubs are less than 20 minutes apart. The event will host 24 teams from Canada, the USA and the Pacific (Asia, Australia, and New Zealand). Should Europe send two teams, USA participation will be reduced to four teams from their current allotment of six.

A) Executive Summary

These championships invite 12 male & 12 female teams from Canada, the USA, Asia and Europe. The participants represent the finest Under-18 curlers in the world. They may even have inspired, in part, the concept of the first Youth Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria 2012. Participating Canadian teams are from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, the Territories and Atlantic Canada. Each year, the event holds invitations for as many as 8 international youth teams with 4 representing American states, 2 representing Asian or Southern Pacific Rim countries and 2 representing European countries.

Our showcase event is administered and staged entirely by volunteers drawn from Curling Clubs and Service Clubs coordinated by one event staff administrator. The hours that are contributed by these members total in the thousands. The Optimist Clubs, and their members, truly live and operate by their motto: "Friend of Youth" and slogan "Bringing Out the Best in Kids" so the youth may compete fully immersed in "The Spirit of Curling". In 2010, the Optimist International organization recognized these championships with their official "Program Seal of Approval" to ensure stability going forward. Until now, there has been a major individual benefactor, but this funding source will not continue and the event must now "stand on its own two feet".

An integral part of the event is the international development camp, carefully tailored to assist the participants in honing their competition skills and serve their individual Long Term Athlete Development needs. There will also be the establishment of a legacy fund with any surplus to provide funding for instruction and development of youth curlers in the host region and province - the most important benefit of hosting and sponsoring this event.

This funding application for \$17,000 will help to afford these youth the opportunity to represent their country, territory, province or state in championships that have been developed solely for their specific age group. There is no other event like this in the world. Your support will assist with athlete development, accommodations and other associated championships competition expenses as well as allowing the development of legacy funding for the youth curlers locally and provincially. You will receive a benefits package as outlined in Section "F" of this proposal.

B) History

Historically, the only major curling competition for youth has been the national and world junior competitions for athletes under 21 years of age. A youth curling forum, attended by representatives from across Canada, met in 1999 and determined that there was a need for a major competition for curlers under 18, high school age.

Within 2 years, in 2001, the Calgary Youth Curling Association created and staged the first ever Optimist Western Canadian Championships; they also hosted this event the following year. Cloverdale and Langley, British Columbia hosted the next two events. It was in BC that the seeds for developing an international event were planted with invitations accepted by Washington State in 2003 and Japan in 2004.

Calgary again hosted the event as a 24 team (12 boys plus 12 girls teams) in 2005 and 2006. They also welcomed teams from the USA and Japan. Then the Championships moved to Winnipeg for 2007 and 2008, welcoming Atlantic Canada and Quebec for more overwhelmingly successful competition and camaraderie. This set the scene for the trek west to Regina in 2009 and 2010.

The 2011 and 2012 Championships saw participants from all the provinces from BC to Quebec, Northwest Territories and Atlantic Canada. We also had six regional USA championship teams and two Asian championship teams. We were most interested to learn from members of Japan's coaching team that they were the only two national teams to compete in Japan or internationally in the months after the March 11, 2011 earthquake and tsunami. The reason, we were told, was that they were Japan's youth, their future.

Each year we have built on the success of the previous year, with increased participation and higher standards. These standards are raised annually based on an intensive system of feedback and change formula of "Where did we go right?", "What went not so well?" and "What are your ideas for next time?" Our "2 years at each host location" formula has contributed to the evolution of an unparalleled athlete development experience that the U-18 Curlers will remember for the rest of their lives.

C) The 2012 Championships

The 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships will be held jointly at the Cloverdale Curling Club and the Langley Curling Club, British Columbia from March 27th to 31st. Both venues will be within easy driving distance from Abbotsford and Vancouver International Airports. The two Curling Clubs are less than 20 minutes apart. The event will host 24 teams from Canada, the USA and the Pacific (Asia, Australia, and New Zealand). Should Europe send two teams, USA participation will be reduced to four teams from their current invitation of six.

Teams will represent Canada from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, the Territories, and Atlantic Canada. Previous USA teams have represented Alaska, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Washington and Wisconsin. Asian or Pacific representatives may once again challenge Japan's top national high school representatives. All teams, as part of their entourage, include coaches, parents, friends and fans.

There will be a Coach and Athlete Development Camp led by expert Canadian Curling Association national coaches providing the participants with a quality level of assistance that may not otherwise be accessible. This is an extremely important cornerstone of the Championships and the Legacy.

Best Western Properties has been selected to host the teams, the Ramada Surrey Langley will host the followers and the gala banquet will be held at a facility to be named. Transportation will be arranged between the hotel and curling venues.

The Optimist Club members are information hosts, hotel hosts, travel hosts, ticket takers, program sellers, souvenir and 50/50 sellers, administrators, etc. They generally provide everything that can be provided to the participants to ensure that their stay, not only in British Columbia, but also in Canada, is an outstanding experience and one that will be remembered for the rest of their lives.

D) The Economics: Requirements and Impacts

The 2013 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships will again have a major economic impact in the host Surrey and Langley region and the Province of BC. Each team has a coach, parents, fans and friends, all of whom have hotel rooms here, eat here, shop here, fuel up here, take taxis here, etc. We anticipate that besides the 24 teams of participants, there will be an accompanying entourage of about 9 people per team.

The room nights will total in excess 400; meals in excess of 2,600; shopping on average of \$25.00 per person and sundry items of some \$50.00 each. The direct economic impact locally and provincially will be in excess of \$400,000.00. The ripple effect for Surrey Langley Area, the Province and Canada can be assessed using a number of various multiplying formulas.

E) The Legacy

The championships have grown from humble beginnings to an unparalleled first class Canadian and International event. Revisiting its original roots and initial goals requires the establishment of a legacy fund to assist in the instruction and development of young curlers in the province, across the country and internationally. The surplus from this showcase event will allow for the establishment of such a fund.

The Optimist International® organization and the U-18 Steering Committee have made special efforts to ensure that the championships align within the Canadian Sport for Life (CS4L) movement Long Term Athlete Development (LTAD) model designed for Sport Canada by the Coaches Association of Canada (CAC) and anticipated in government grant funding application documents.

The establishment of programs for young curlers as a result of the legacy from this event has already taken place in the other provinces that have hosted the Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships.

Although it is wonderful to host such an event, in the end, we all must make sure that the real winners are the kids. The establishment of this fund ensures a strong future for our youth.



Introduction

The Optimist Junior Interclub Curling League is proud to be hosting the "Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships" in the Cloverdale Curling Club and Langley Curling Club, British Columbia, from March 27 to March 31, 2013. Our Ol U-18 slogan is: "Curling is Fun. Competition is Fun. Improvement is Fun."

The curlers are girls and boys aged 17 and under as of December 31, 2012. By this age, improvement and achievement have become key elements of "FUN". To this end, post-provincial and post-national competition provides both a goal and a vehicle. Our Optimist International sponsored championships fulfill a very real need for a major curling competition at this age level. As in marketing, each element of the continuum "Showcase-Awareness-Trial-Development-Competition-Showcase", is essential to the success of attracting and retaining youth as they learn and develop life skills through sport.

"Friend of Youth" is the motto of Optimist International®. The Optimist Junior International Curling Club has incorporated to become the title sponsor of this event. This Optimist Club formalizes a partnership that benefits both youth and the community. Optimist Clubs of the Lower Mainland in BC have supported our Optimist Junior Interclub league for 17 years. Curling communities across Canada and around the world will reap the benefits of these international championships (I have a story to tell you about youth curling support in Japan). The Optimist Magazine, published 4 times per year, with a circulation of 90,000, has featured our event.

Background

The first annual events were headlined as "Optimist Western Canada Juvenile Curling Championships" and were deemed overwhelmingly successful. Male and female teams were invited from Northwest Territories, Yukon and the four western provinces. Calgary Youth Curling Association hosted these two events.

In 2003, Optimist Junior Interclub Curling League hosted the third annual event and the title became "Optimist International Juvenile Curling Championships". Teams from eight regions were invited from Ontario westward and Washington State. With the inclusion of American teams and the endorsement of Optimist International®, we could appropriately add "International" to the title. We received formal permission the following year.

2004 Optimist International U-18 Curling Championships

The title changed, replacing Juvenile with a more appropriate reference to "U-18". In all, twelve regions were invited representing territories and provinces from across Canada, nine American States and even Japan!

2013 Invitations

Our invitation list has been further re-written to accept applications from the Asia-Pacific region and Europe (eastern and western regions).

Skills Development

In addition to the competition, there is a strong skills development component for the teams and for their coaches. We have been fortunate to have a number of renowned National Training Coaches from the Canadian Curling Association to design and coordinate the development camp program each year. This ensures a well-balanced combination of training and competition.



Why "Youth Curling Development" and "Optimists - Bringing out the Best in Children" is such a perfect fit.

- 1. In curling, a child does not need to be bigger, faster or stronger to grow from playground to podium.
- 2. Children dream. Count the interviews where Olympians said their dream began when they were 10 years old. The Olympics! Imagine. A 10-year old sure can.
- 3. In curling, 100% of the time, for every play, each player, puts in their equal share of the team effort.
- 4. Affiliation is a life need, a need for life, a life skill and a skill for life. Curling is an opportunity to join. Want to join a gang? Join our gang. Join when you're in 5th grade.
- 5. Curling is inclusive, providing the bully with a venue in which to learn leadership and providing the victims with an environment in which to thrive. Each child is on the team. This is extremely important, even pivotal, to a child of this age. Everyone plays from start to finish, in every game, and in every Optimist competition.
- 6. An active lifestyle, beginning age 0 to 6, is fundamental to healthy childhood development. Fundamental Movement Skills (FMS) are essential to overall physical development of children and youth.
- 7. A child's active start can prevent childhood diabetes associated with the 9-year old couch potato. Vigorous exercise in pre-pubescence is reported to aid in prevention of breast cancer. For optimum physical development, fast twitch muscles are best trained at age 9-11 for explosive strength used in curling for brushing reaction and leg thrust. This protocol provides the child with a valuable fundamental sport skill.
- 8. Going on road trips seem to be our best memories of youth development and competition, even when the road trip was only 30 minutes to the next town.
- 9. Children like competition so we work to get them into the league with their peers right at the beginning of their first year. After all, a curling game is a competition.


