SUBJECT: Sponsorship Request - Youth Strengths Conference

RECOMMENDATION

The Finance & Technology Department recommends that the Finance Committee recommend that Council approve a sponsorship contribution of \$5,000 from the Council Initiatives Fund in support of the Youth Strengths Conference to be held on July 23 to 25, 2014.

BACKGROUND

Acting Together: Community University Research Alliance (AT-CURA) has invited the City to be a sponsor for the Youth Strengths Conference. The title of this conference is Youth Strengths & Prevention of Delinquency and Gang Involvement: Academics and Community Acting Together and will be held at the Sheraton Vancouver Guildford from July 23 to July 25, 2014.

AT-CURA is a strength based project aimed at preventing youth gang involvement and represents collaboration between academic researchers and community partners. The aim of AT-CURA is to identify factors that prevent youth from violent and gang-related criminal activities and to provide an evidence-based foundation to create programs to foster the identified preventive factors among youth.

DISCUSSION

AT-CURA is hosting a two day conference on Youth Strengths & Prevention of Delinquency and Gang Involvement: Academics and Community Acting Together from July 23 to 25, 2014 at the Sheraton Vancouver Guildford. This conference will share research and practice focusing on youth strengths to develop or improve youth programs and public policy.

The conference will host keynote speakers Robert Biswas-Diener, author of The Courage Quotient and Kimberly Schonert-Reichl, an Applied Developmental Psychologist and Professor at UBC. In addition, a session on youth gang prevention will be presented. The conference program is attached as *Appendix "I"*.

Staff has reviewed this sponsorship request and recommends that a sponsorship grant of \$5,000 be provided by the City for this event. The Grants Evaluation Committee recommends that funding to sponsor this event be allocated from the Council Initiatives Fund as it does not meet the criteria of the City Grants Policy.

Funding in the Council Initiatives Fund

If Council adopts the recommendation of this report, the un-allocated balance in the Council Initiatives Fund would be \$144,776 as documented in *Appendix "II"*.

SUSTAINABILITY CONSIDERATIONS

The Youth Strengths Conference supports the Crime Reduction Strategy (socio-cultural goal 17), through education and awareness, with a focus on youth.
