SUBJECT: Cloverdale Curling Club Operating Agreement 2015 - 2020

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Parks, Recreation and Culture Department and the Finance and Technology Department recommend that Council approve the renewal of the 2015-2020 Cloverdale Curling Arena operating agreement in the amount of \$65,000 per year plus an annual increase for CPI to a maximum of 2% to be operated by the Cloverdale Curling Club (the "Club") as generally described in this report.

## **BACKGROUND**

The Cloverdale Curling Club (previously known as Valley Curling Club) has been operating in the existing building since it was built in 1981. The most recent operating agreement (2010 – 2015) will expire on August 15, 2015.

The Cloverdale Curling Club provides an excellent recreational and social opportunity for Surrey residents through learn to curl programs, leagues and other community events. The Club has over 500 members participating in weekly leagues, bonspiels and special events. The Club also provides curling opportunities for several hundred elementary and secondary students each year, as well as seniors.

The facility contains 6 curling sheets, a pro shop, kitchen and concession area on the main floor with a 224 seat licensed lounge and viewing area on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. During the 'off-season' (April 15 – August 15) Parks, Recreation & Culture (PRC) assumes use of the dry floor area for recreational programs and rentals. The Club retains operation of the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor lounge area over the off- season period for use as a meeting room and banquet facility.

#### **DISCUSSION**

In response to declining membership numbers in 2011/2012 and 2012/2013 (531, 518 respectively), the Cloverdale Curling Club has made some significant program improvements including the following:

- Increased flexibility to potential curlers with the introduction of "Drop In" curling;
- Provided opportunities for families to try curling;
- Expanded on league formats to attract potential curlers;
- Participation in Cloverdale's annual Christmas Parade;
- Implementation of new fee structures;
- Hosted Learn-to-Play opportunities; and
- Hosted several Regional, Provincial and International events.

As a result of these strategies the membership has increased to 572 members in 2013/2014 and 593 in 2014/2015.

Despite increases in participation, the Club continues to have financial challenges. With direct competition in Langley and White Rock, the Club strives to keep the membership and drop-in fees competitive. The Curling Club's fee comparison is attached as **Appendix I**. Further, the Club did not receive a gaming grant (\$40,000) for the 2014/2015 season. The Club actively pursues grants annually to offset operational costs. City owned Curling clubs in the Lower Mainland receive varying level of financial support from the municipality to assist with operating expenses. City staff recognizes that the Cloverdale Curling Club continues to operate the facility very efficiently and effectively and that the Club operates the facility at a lower cost than if the City were to operate the facility.

Over the past five years there have been increases in operating costs such as utilities and maintenance services as well as decreases in revenues from alcohol/bar and food service.

The City of Surrey has provided grant funding to the Cloverdale Curling Club in the amount of \$60,000 annually for the past five years. The 2014 financial statements (attached as **Appendix II**) indicate a Net Income of \$3,525.

The Club is requesting an increase of \$5,000 per year of the agreement to \$65,000 annually with subsequent increases to the grant equal to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) capped at 2% for the four remaining years. The additional funding would allow the club to maintain accessible and affordable curling opportunities to all segments of the community. Annual amounts in the 2015 – 2020 operating agreement are as follows:

- Year 1 \$65,000
- Year 2 \$66,300
- Year 3 \$67,626
- Year 4 \$68,979
- Year 5 \$70,358

The City of Surrey will continue to provide support to the Club for the building envelope, building systems and refrigeration equipment. Under the terms of the new operating agreement the Club will continue to be responsible for the day to day operating costs.

### **SUSTAINABILITY CONSIDERATIONS**

The recommendations of this report are consistent with the objectives of the City's Sustainability Charter; more particularly, the following action items of the Charter:

EC2: The City will support and encourage community economic development;

SC12: The City will encourage and facilitate volunteerism and participation in community activities.

Additionally, entering into an agreement with the Club for the operation of the Cloverdale Curling Rink will assist the City in meeting the Sustainability Charter's Socio-Cultural Goal 1 through "providing a range of accessible and affordable recreation, cultural and library services that respond to the needs and interests of the City's diverse population, including children, youth, seniors, multi-cultural groups, families and those with special needs."

### **CONCLUSION**

Based on the above discussion, it is recommended that approval be given to enter into an operating agreement between the City of Surrey and the Cloverdale Curling Club for the 5-year term of 2015 through 2020. If approved, the operating agreement would include \$65,000 to the Club with increases equal to the Consumer Price Index annually for the last four years of the agreement.
