SUBJECT: Funding Request – 2017 Surrey Social Innovation Summit

RECOMMENDATION

The Planning & Development Department and the Finance & Technology Department recommend that Council:

- 1. Receive this report as information; and
- 2. Approve an allocation of up to \$30,000 from the Council Initiatives Fund in support of the Social Innovation Summit scheduled for November 15, 2017 at Surrey City Hall and as generally described in this report.

INTENT

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with the results of the 2016 Social Innovation Summit, and to provide information regarding the upcoming Social Innovation Summit in November 2017. Additionally, this report serves as a request that \$30,000 from the Council Initiatives Fund be assigned to the 2017 Surrey Social Innovation Summit.

BACKGROUND

As one of Canada's fastest growing cities, with up to 1,000 new residents every month, Surrey recognizes that collaborative efforts among government, citizens, not-for-profits, and business is key to finding practical and sustainable solutions to many of the issues facing modern cities and local neighbourhoods. Surrey also recognizes that innovation is required to find solutions that will address the root causes of complex social issues such as homelessness, poverty, and immigrant/refugee integration.

Social Innovation

Social innovation is an approach for tackling complex social issues. Rather than managing problems, it focuses on experimenting and testing new ideas and approaches that address the root causes. The goal of social innovation is to create a smart and caring community.

The Vancouver Foundation defines social innovation as "a project, process or program that changes a social system by changing one or more of the following:

- the basic routines (how we act and what we do);
- the flow of resources (money, knowledge, people);
- the authority flows (laws, policies, rules); and
- the beliefs (what we believe is true, right/wrong)

Governments and foundations are increasingly fostering social innovation. Federal government ministries, such as Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada and Immigrant, Refugees and Citizenship Canada, have designated funding streams for social innovation projects. BC's Ministry of Social Development and Social Innovation appointed the BC Social Innovation Council in 2011 and established BC Partners for Social Impact. The McConnell Foundation and Vancouver Foundation are examples of private foundations that are focusing investments on social innovation.

Surrey Social Innovation Summit

Surrey's Social Innovation Summit (the "Summit") is designed to nurture and build the capacity for social innovation in Surrey. It provides a unique opportunity for government, non-profit, education, and business leaders in Surrey to engage with some of the leading global experts in social innovation, and to profile local champions.

The City hosted Social Innovation Summits in 2015 and 2016. Highlights of 2016's Summit included:

- A Social Innovation Leaders Breakfast Series began to generate excitement leading up to the 2016 Summit. Breakfast sessions were held in May, July, and September 2016, and provided over 100 attendees with an opportunity to learn about successful projects and explore key questions related to social innovation.
- Eleven sessions with over 40 panelists and speakers. Local panelists highlighted solutions happening at home in Surrey, while speakers from across Canada and the US, inspired with innovations from elsewhere.
- Sessions included themes such as financing and investment in social innovation, building
 and branding better neighbourhoods and cities, how to catalyze social innovation,
 creativity and place-making that transforms communities, and more.
- The Summit attracted approximately 200 attendees. Participant response was extremely positive, with over 97% indicating they would return in 2017.

DISCUSSION

Building on the success of the first two Summits, the third annual Surrey Social Innovation Summit is scheduled for November 15, 2017 at Surrey City Hall. The theme of the 2017 Summit is "Social and Economic Inclusion: Cities as Solutions."

The Summit planning group is co-chaired by Councillor LeFranc and Stephen Dooley, Executive Director, SFU Surrey Campus, and it includes representatives from local non-profits, Simon Fraser and Kwantlen Polytechnic Universities, Vancity Credit Union, Downtown Surrey BIA, and City staff. The PACE Group has been contracted to provide registration and event management services.

Doug Saunders is confirmed as the Opening Keynote speaker. Mr. Saunders is a Canadian-British author and journalist. He is the author of the award-winning book "Arrival City: The Final Migration and Our Next World," and he is the International-Affairs columnist for The Globe and Mail. Doug Saunders' keynote speech theme is "Arrival City: How the Largest Migration in History is Reshaping Surrey and the World."

The program for the 2017 Social Innovation Summit is not yet finalized. Session themes that are being explored include:

- Building for Inclusion;
- Place-making with People in Mind;
- Social Procurement;
- Accessing the Economy (hiring persons with barriers to employment);
- Safe and Inclusive Cities;
- Every Voice Matters (public participation);
- Racism, Discrimination and a Diverse Community;
- Indigenous and Vulnerable Youth; and
- Learning and Leading Social Innovation.

The Summit sponsorship package is attached as Appendix "I."

Budget

A draft budget has been prepared which indicates that the event will cost approximately \$90,000.

It is estimated that revenues from sponsorships and registrations will amount to approximately \$60,000. It is proposed that Council approve an allocation from the Council Initiatives Fund of up to \$30,000 in support of the 2017 Surrey Social Innovation Summit (Appendix "II").

SUSTAINABILITY CONSIDERATIONS

The 2017 Surrey Social Innovation Summit supports Desired Outcomes (DO) identified in the Sustainability Charter 2.0; specifically:

- Social Infrastructure and Innovation DO24: Surrey has a strong social infrastructure that supports the needs of its diverse and growing population; and
- Social Infrastructure and Innovation DO25: Surrey has a culture of collaboration and innovation to solve complex social problems.
