

The Art of the Sari March 31 – June 10, 2007

It seems that every week our newspapers carry a story that includes references to the sari. Whether it's in the gossip column about what model Elizabeth Hurley wore at her recent wedding, or a fashion spread on the influence of Bollywood on western style, or a news story describing the scene of a tragic train explosion in Pakistan, the sari's beauty, popularity, and connection with history continues to be remarkable.

The earliest known reference to the sari is in the Vedas, the oldest form of written text, dating back 5000 years. Over millennia, the sari's form has persisted, essentially unchanged, despite colonialism, industrialization, and the pressures of international trade. Its adaptability, practicality, and beauty continue to ensure its future. Although identified as the quintessential Indian garment, a billion women of diverse ancestry living around the world, including Canada, currently choose to wear the sari. As a testament to this, almost all of the saris on exhibition here are borrowed from individuals and retailers from this community.



The sari as an art form embodies the skills of its weavers, dyers, embroiderers, and designers who continue to explore its infinitely variable form, as contemporary fashion. It also includes the artfulness of those women who wear the sari, and manage its pleats and folds and drapes with creativity, grace and dignity. All of this has served to inspire the poets, whose words accompany the saris on exhibit.
