


Foundational priorities

Equitable Communication:

Use various channels to inform the public about age-friendly services and programs for older adults, families, and caregivers.

Advocacy and Collaboration:

Advocate for and collaborate with stakeholders to integrate age-friendly perspectives into the City's plans and strategies.

Indigenous Community Engagement:

Engage with Elders of Indigenous communities in Surrey, acknowledging their unique perspectives and needs.

Partnership Building Foundation:

Partnerships with the Age Friendly Network to collectively enhance support for older adults in Surrey.

These foundational priorities serve as the cornerstone of our efforts to promote safety, health, and wellness for older adults in the community.

Age Friendly Network

The Age Friendly Network includes diverse community-based groups such as Settlement Services, Fraser Health, Division of Family Practice, Surrey Accessibility Leadership Committee (SALT), Surrey Fire Services, Police, Transportation, Housing and Social Development, Surrey Libraries and Fraser Region Aboriginal Friendship Centre (FRAFCA).

Purpose of the Age Friendly Network:

- Connect individuals, service agencies, and organizations working with seniors.
- Carry out initiatives supporting the goals of the strategy.
- Share information about programs and services for seniors, caregivers, and families in Surrey.



Actions and Implementations


